- 1. AN INSIDE JOB, by Daniel Silva. (Harper.) The 25th book in the Gabriel Allon series. The art world, the mob and the Vatican intersect when a Leonardo da Vinci painting goes missing. <u>B</u>
- 2. THE ENCHANTED GREENHOUSE, by Sarah Beth Durst. (Bramble.) In this novel set in the world of "The Spellshop," Terlu Perna must figure out a sorcerer's secrets to save an island containing magical greenhouses. <u>B</u>
- 3. THREE SHATTERED SOULS, by Mai Corland. (Red Tower.) The third book in the Broken Blades series. Allegiances are upended as the Blades face new threats.
- 4. ATMOSPHERE, by Taylor Jenkins Reid. (Ballantine.) In the summer of 1980, Joan Goodwin begins training with a group of candidates for NASA's space shuttle program. <u>B</u>
- 5. ROSE IN CHAINS, by Julie Soto. (Forever.) After the dark forces win the war, Evermore's princess, Briony Rosewood, is auctioned off to a member of a family known for its viciousness.
- 6. THE WEDDING PEOPLE, by Alison Espach. (Holt.) A woman who is down on her luck forms an unexpected bond with the bride at a wedding in Rhode Island. <u>H B</u>
- NEVER FLINCH, by Stephen King. (Scribner.) Holly Gibney does double duty by helping head off acts of retribution and protecting a women's rights activist. <u>H B</u>
- 8. THE GIRL I WAS, by Jeneva Rose. (MIRA.) After a breakup and the loss of her job, Alexis wakes up in her college town in the year 2002 and comes across her 18-year-old self.
- 9. ONYX STORM, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) The third book in the Empyrean series. As enemies gain traction, Violet Sorrengail goes beyond the Aretian wards in search of allies. <u>H B</u>
- 10. THE WOMAN IN SUITE 11, by Ruth Ware. (Gallery/Scout.) The second book in the Lo Blacklock series. Blacklock attends the opening of a luxury Swiss hotel and gets swept up in a dangerous pursuit across Europe. **B**
- 11. MY FRIENDS, by Fredrik Backman. (Atria.) A young woman looks into the story behind a painting that was made 25 years ago and a small group of teens depicted in it; translated by Neil Smith. <u>H B</u>
- 12. BROKEN COUNTRY, by Clare Leslie Hall. (Simon & Schuster.) Beth must confront her past when the man she once loved as a teenager returns to the village with his son. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 13. THE UNRAVELING OF JULIA, by Lisa Scottoline. (Grand Central.) Julia Pritzker encounters strange and deadly things when she goes to claim the Tuscan villa and vineyard she inherited from a stranger. <u>B</u>

- 14. GREAT BIG BEAUTIFUL LIFE, by Emily Henry. (Berkley.) A writer looking for her big break competes against a Pulitzer winner to tell the story of an octogenarian with a storied past. <u>H B</u>

- 1. THE IDAHO FOUR, by James Patterson and Vicky Ward. (Little, Brown.) Investigations into the murders of four University of Idaho students on Nov. 13, 2022.
- 2. ALGOSPEAK, by Adam Aleksic. (Knopf.) A linguist and content creator known as the "Etymology Nerd" delineates the impact of internet algorithms on language and communication.
- 3. THE MISSION, by Tim Weiner. (Mariner.) The author of "Legacy of Ashes" chronicles changes and struggles at the Central Intelligence Agency in the 21st century. <u>B</u>
