- 1. THE WIDOW, by John Grisham. (Doubleday.) When Simon Latch, a lawyer in rural Virginia, is accused of murder, he goes in search of the real killer. H B
- 2. THE SECRET OF SECRETS, by Dan Brown. (Doubleday.) As he searches for the missing noetic scientist he has been seeing, Robert Langdon discovers something regarding a secret project. H B
- 3. ALCHEMISED, by SenLinYu. (Del Rey.) After the war, an imprisoned alchemist is sent to a necromancer to recover her lost memories. B
- 4. GONE BEFORE GOODBYE, by Reese Witherspoon and Harlan Coben. (Grand Central.) When a mysterious man disappears, the former combat surgeon giving him medical assistance goes on the lam. B
- 5. THE CHRISTMAS STRANGER, by Richard Paul Evans. (Gallery.) Three years after a tragedy, a computer repairman encounters several people who make him reconsider the value of his life. B
- 6. TWICE, by Mitch Albom. (Harper.) Alfie Logan, who was gifted with the ability to live any moment a second time but must accept the outcomes, makes a risky love decision. B
- 7. REMAIN, by Nicholas Sparks with M. Night Shyamalan. (Random House.) A New York architect moves to Cape Cod, where he enters a relationship that brings up a lot of questions. B
- 8. THE PROVING GROUND, by Michael Connelly. (Little, Brown.) The eighth book in the Lincoln Lawyer series. Mickey Haller enlists a journalist to help his lawsuit against an A.I. company. B
- 9. THE INTRUDER, by Freida McFadden. (Poisoned Pen.) During a rough storm, Casey puts herself in danger when she lets a girl, who is covered in blood, into her cabin. H B
- 10. EMPIRE OF THE DAWN, by Jay Kristoff. (St. Martin's.) The third book in the Empire of the Vampire series. A final battle will alter the state of the Empire. B
- 11. THE BLACK WOLF, by Louise Penny. (Minotaur.) The 20th book in the Chief Inspector Gamache series. After thwarting a terrorist attack, an injured Gamache leads a covert investigation. H B
- 12. BONDS OF HERCULES, by Jasmine Mas. (Canary Street.) The second book in the Villains of Lore series. Seduction and danger put Hercules in a tough spot. B
- 13. THE CORRESPONDENT, by Virginia Evans. (Crown.) Letters from someone she used to know push Sybil Van Antwerp toward revisiting her past and finding a way to forgive. B

- 14. QUEEN ESTHER by John Irving. (Simon & Schuster.) In a novel set in the world of "The Cider House Rule," a Jewish woman who grew up orphaned is affected by antisemitism.
- 15. THE BRIDGE KINGDOM, by Danielle L. Jensen. (Del Rey.) Lara's sense of self and loyalty to her land become tested as her feelings toward her husband shift. B
