Fiction

- 1. NEVER FLINCH, by Stephen King. (Scribner.) Holly Gibney does double duty by helping head off acts of retribution and protecting a women's rights activist. <u>H B</u>
- 2. HIDDEN NATURE, by Nora Roberts. (St. Martin's.) After recovering from a gunshot, a Natural Resources police officer investigates a woman's disappearance. <u>O B</u>
- 3. THE KNIGHT AND THE MOTH, by Rachel Gillig. (Orbit.) Sybil Delling, who is gifted with the power of foresight, forms an alliance with a heretical knight when her sister Diviners disappear. B
- 4. GREAT BIG BEAUTIFUL LIFE, by Emily Henry. (Berkley.) A writer looking for her big break competes against a Pulitzer winner to tell the story of an octogenarian with a storied past. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 5. NIGHTSHADE, by Michael Connelly. (Little, Brown.) The Los Angeles County sheriff's detective Stilwell gets reassigned to Catalina Island, where he investigates a poaching case and a Jane Doe found in the harbor. B
- 6. MY FRIENDS, by Fredrik Backman. (Atria.) A young woman looks into the story behind a painting that was made 25 years ago and a small group of teens depicted in it; translated by Neil Smith. <u>B</u>
- 7. THE EMPEROR OF GLADNESS, by Ocean Vuong. (Penguin Press.) A young man becomes the caretaker of an elderly widow and they form a bond over the course of a year. <u>B</u>
- 8. SHIELD OF SPARROWS, by Devney Perry. (Red Tower.) A princess deals with various adversaries as she moves into the role she chooses for herself, not the one chosen for her. <u>B</u>
- 9. ONYX STORM, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) The third book in the Empyrean series. As enemies gain traction, Violet Sorrengail goes beyond the Aretian wards in search of allies. <u>H B</u>
- 10. THE PERFECT DIVORCE, by Jeneva Rose. (Blackstone.) Around the time of the disappearance of a woman who had a onenight stand with the attorney Sarah Morgan's new husband, police reopen the investigation into the murder of her first husband's mistress. <u>B</u>
- 11. JAMES, by Percival Everett. (Doubleday.) A reimagining of "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" shines a different light on Mark Twain's classic, revealing new facets of the character of Jim. <u>H B</u>
- 12. RETURN TO SENDER, by Craig Johnson. (Viking.) The 21st book in the Longmire series. An otherworldly cult might be connected to the disappearance of a mail person who handles a 300-mile daily route. <u>H B</u>
- 13. BROKEN COUNTRY, by Clare Leslie Hall. (Simon & Schuster.) Beth must confront her past when the man she once loved as a teenager returns to the village with his son. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>

- 14. THE WEDDING PEOPLE, by Alison Espach. (Holt.) A woman who is down on her luck forms an unexpected bond with the bride at a wedding in Rhode Island. <u>H B</u>
- 15. STRANGERS IN TIME, by David Baldacci. (Grand Central.) In London in 1944, two teenagers dealing with the dangers of World War II form an alliance with a bookshop owner. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>

- 1. ORIGINAL SIN, by Jake Tapper and Alex Thompson. (Penguin Press.) An account of Joe Biden's initial decision to run for reelection in 2024 and its numerous consequences. <u>B</u>
- 2. THE ANXIOUS GENERATION, by Jonathan Haidt. (Penguin Press.) A co-author of "The Coddling of the American Mind" looks at the mental health impacts that a phone-based life has on children. <u>H B</u>
- 3. MARK TWAIN, by Ron Chernow. (Penguin Press.) The Pulitzer Prize-winning biographer portrays the life and career of the literary celebrity and political pundit. <u>B</u>
- 4. ABUNDANCE, by Ezra Klein and Derek Thompson. (Avid Reader.) A New York Times opinion columnist and a staff writer at The Atlantic evaluate obstacles to American progress. <u>H B</u>
- 5. BIG DUMB EYES, by Nate Bargatze. (Grand Central.) The Grammy Award-nominated comedian shares snippets from his life and career. B
- UNCOMMON FAVOR, by Dawn Staley. (Atria/Black Privilege.) The three-time Olympic gold medalist and six-time W.N.B.A. All-Star, who is the head coach for the South Carolina Gamecocks women's basketball team, describes obstacles she encountered on and off the court. <u>B</u>
- 7. APPLE IN CHINA, by Patrick McGee. (Scribner.) A journalist depicts the development of Apple's supply chain and its increasingly precarious relationship with China.
- 8. EVERYTHING IS TUBERCULOSIS, by John Green. (Crash Course.) The author of "The Anthropocene Reviewed" chronicles the fight against the deadly infectious disease tuberculosis. <u>H B</u>
- 9. THE FATE OF THE DAY, by Rick Atkinson. (Crown.) The author of "The British Are Coming" portrays the middle years of the American Revolution.
- 10. MY NEXT BREATH, by Jeremy Renner. (Flatiron.) The Academy Award-nominated actor tells the story of the accident he had with a snowplow and his efforts to recover from it. <u>B</u>
- 11. OUTLIVE, by Peter Attia with Bill Gifford. (Harmony.) A look at recent scientific research on aging and longevity. B
- 12. THE SERVICEBERRY, by Robin Wall Kimmerer. (Scribner.) The author of "Braiding Sweetgrass" illuminates how the gift economy in the natural world works and draws lessons for our economy; with illustrations by John Burgoyne. <u>H B</u>
- 13. STEVE MARTIN WRITES THE WRITTEN WORD, by Steve Martin. (Grand Central.) The comedian brings together previously and newly published words he wrote such as "strudel," "Filofax" and "socks."
- 14. REMEMBER US, by Robert M. Edsel with Bret Witter. (Harper Horizon.) The authors of "The Monuments Men" document the stories of a dozen people who lived during World War II.
- 15. EMPIRE OF AI, by Karen Hao. (Penguin Press.) An examination of the disruptions made and resources taken by artificial intelligence.
