2. THE HALLMARKED MAN, by Robert Galbraith. (Mulholland.) The eighth book in the Cormoran Strike series. A dismembered corpse found in a silver shop sets off an investigation. [H](#)
3. WILD REVERENCE, by Rebecca Ross. (Saturday.) In a novel written for adults that is set in the world of "Divine Rivals," a goddess named Matilda is faced with making a great sacrifice. [H](#)
