- 1. THE FALLEN & THE KISS OF DUSK, by Carissa Broadbent. (Bramble.) The fourth book in the Crowns of Nyaxia series and second book of the Shadowborn Duet.
- 2. SCARRED, by Emily McIntire. (Bloom.) The second book in the Never After series. Lady Sara Beatreaux develops an attraction for one of the men she intended to kill. B
- 3. ATMOSPHERE, by Taylor Jenkins Reid. (Ballantine.) In the summer of 1980, Joan Goodwin begins training with a group of candidates for NASA's space shuttle program. **B**
- 4. NOT QUITE DEAD YET, by Holly Jackson. (Bantam.) With only a week left to live after a violent attack on Halloween, Jet Mason is determined to solve her own murder. B
- 5. ONYX STORM, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) The third book in the Empyrean series. As enemies gain traction, Violet Sorrengail goes beyond the Aretian wards in search of allies. H B
- 6. MY FRIENDS, by Fredrik Backman. (Atria.) A young woman looks into the story behind a painting that was made 25 years ago and a small group of teens depicted in it; translated by Neil Smith. H B
- 7. BROKEN COUNTRY, by Clare Leslie Hall. (Simon & Schuster.) Beth must confront her past when the man she once loved as a teenager returns to the village with his son. H B
- 8. AN INSIDE JOB, by Daniel Silva. (Harper.) The 25th book in the Gabriel Allon series. The art world, the mob and the Vatican intersect when a Leonardo da Vinci painting goes missing. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 9. THE WEDDING PEOPLE, by Alison Espach. (Holt.) A woman who is down on her luck forms an unexpected bond with the bride at a wedding in Rhode Island. H B
- 10. THE HAMPTONS LAWYER, by James Patterson and Mike Lupica. (Little, Brown.) The third book in the Jane Smith thriller series. Taking on a celebrity client proves dangerous. H B
- 11. JAMES, by Percival Everett. (Doubleday.) A reimagining of "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" shines a different light on Mark Twain's classic, revealing new facets of the character of Jim. H B
- 12. GREAT BIG BEAUTIFUL LIFE, by Emily Henry. (Berkley.) A writer looking for her big break competes against a Pulitzer winner to tell the story of an octogenarian with a storied past. H B
- 13. NEVER FLINCH, by Stephen King. (Scribner.) Holly Gibney does double duty by helping head off acts of retribution and protecting a women's rights activist. H B

- 14. THE ENCHANTED GREENHOUSE, by Sarah Beth Durst. (Bramble.) In this novel set in the world of "The Spellshop," Terlu Perna must figure out a sorcerer's secrets to save an island containing magical greenhouses. B
- 15. DUNGEON CRAWLER CARL, by Matt Dinniman. (Ace.) A Coast Guard vet named Carl and his ex-girlfriend's cat, Princess Donut, are trapped in a fantasy dungeon.

Non-Fiction

- 1. COMING UP SHORT, by Robert B. Reich. (Knopf.) An economist who served in three presidential administrations gives his perspective on his generation's impact on democracy, society and the economy.
- 2. ON POWER, by Mark R. Levin. (Threshold Editions.) The Fox News host considers various facets of power and its effect on history.
- 3. ONE NATION ALWAYS UNDER GOD, by Tim Scott. (Broadside.) The Republican senator from South Carolina depicts the influence Christianity had on some prominent people and institutions.
- 4. DISNEY ADULTS, by AJ Wolfe. (Gallery.) An exploration of the subculture of loyal fans, composed of grown-ups, of the Disney films, merchandise and theme parks.

- 8. KING OF KINGS, by Scott Anderson. (Doubleday.) The author of "Lawrence of Arabia" weaves together the history of the Iranian revolution.
- 9. EVERYTHING IS TUBERCULOSIS, by John Green. (Crash Course.) The author of "The Anthropocene Reviewed" chronicles the fight against the deadly infectious disease tuberculosis. H B
- 10. BLACK AF HISTORY, by Michael Harriot. (Dey Street.) A columnist at TheGrio.com articulates moments in American history that center the perspectives and experiences of Black Americans. <u>B</u>
- 11. TONIGHT IN JUNGLELAND, by Peter Ames Carlin. (Doubleday.) The author of "Bruce" portrays the making of Springsteen's album "Born to Run."
- 12. GHOSTS OF HIROSHIMA, by Charles Pellegrino. (Blackstone.) Firsthand accounts from people affected by the dropping of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima.
