Fiction

- 1. A CURSE CARVED IN BONE, by Danielle L. Jensen. (Del Rey.) The second book in the Saga of the Unfated series. As war seems imminent, Freya fights a battle within herself.
- 2. THE EMPEROR OF GLADNESS, by Ocean Vuong. (Penguin Press.) A young man becomes the caretaker of an elderly widow and they form a bond over the course of a year.
- 3. GREAT BIG BEAUTIFUL LIFE, by Emily Henry. (Berkley.) A writer looking for her big break competes against a Pulitzer winner to tell the story of an octogenarian with a storied past. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 4. SHIELD OF SPARROWS, by Devney Perry. (Red Tower.) A princess deals with various adversaries as she moves into the role she chooses for herself, not the one chosen for her.
- 5. THE DEVILS, by Joe Abercrombie. (Tor.) Brother Diaz, who is assigned to a new flock consisting of monsters and murderers, embarks on an arduous journey.
- 6. MY FRIENDS, by Fredrik Backman. (Atria.) A young woman looks into the story behind a painting that was made 25 years ago and a small group of teens depicted in it; translated by Neil Smith. <u>B</u>
- 7. I HOPE YOU REMEMBER, by Josie Balka. (Simon Element.) A collection of poems expressing universal emotions and events.
- 8. FEVER BEACH, by Carl Hiaasen. (Knopf.) A divorced climate warrior and a transplanted Floridian residing with a Proud Boys reject get involved in a dark money mystery.
- 9. ONYX STORM, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) The third book in the Empyrean series. As enemies gain traction, Violet Sorrengail goes beyond the Aretian wards in search of allies. <u>H B</u>
- 10. THE EYE OF THE BEDLAM BRIDE, by Matt Dinniman. (Ace.) The sixth book in the Dungeon Crawler Carl series. On the eighth floor, Carl and Donut must capture a lethal monster.
- 11. JAMES, by Percival Everett. (Doubleday.) A reimagining of "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" shines a different light on Mark Twain's classic, revealing new facets of the character of Jim. <u>H B</u>
- 12. SILVER ELITE, by Dani Francis. (Del Rey.) Wren Darlington winds up in the elite training program of her enemy and finds it hard to resist their commanding officer, Cross Redden. <u>H</u>
- 13. THE MISSING HALF, by Ashley Flowers with Alex Kiester. (Bantam.) Years after their sisters went missing in a similar way, Nicole Monroe and Jenna Connor team up to search for them.

- 14. THE PERFECT DIVORCE, by Jeneva Rose. (Blackstone.) Around the time of the disappearance of a woman who had a onenight stand with the attorney Sarah Morgan's new husband, police reopen the investigation into the murder of her first husband's mistress. <u>B</u>
- 15. 25 ALIVE, by James Patterson and Maxine Paetro. (Little, Brown.) The 25th book in the Women's Murder Club series. Lindsay Boxer's former partner is the victim at a crime scene. <u>H B</u>

- 1. MARK TWAIN, by Ron Chernow. (Penguin Press.) The Pulitzer Prize-winning biographer portrays the life and career of the literary celebrity and political pundit.
- 2. THE ANXIOUS GENERATION, by Jonathan Haidt. (Penguin Press.) A co-author of "The Coddling of the American Mind" looks at the mental health impacts that a phone-based life has on children. <u>O B</u>
- 3. BIG DUMB EYES, by Nate Bargatze. (Grand Central.) The Grammy Award-nominated comedian shares snippets from his life and career. <u>B</u>
- 4. LAWLESS, by Leah Litman. (Atria/One Signal.) A co-host of the podcast Strict Scrutiny argues that the conservative Supreme Court justices are committed to protecting religious conservatives and Republican officials.
- 5. MATRIARCH, by Tina Knowles with Kevin Carr O'Leary. (One World.) The businesswoman, who is the mother of Beyoncé Knowles-Carter and Solange Knowles, traces her life's journey.
- ABUNDANCE, by Ezra Klein and Derek Thompson. (Avid Reader.) A New York Times opinion columnist and a staff writer at The Atlantic evaluate obstacles to American progress. <u>H B</u>
- 7. MY NEXT BREATH, by Jeremy Renner. (Flatiron.) The Academy Award-nominated actor tells the story of the accident he had with a snowplow and his efforts to recover from it. **B**
- 8. EVERYTHING IS TUBERCULOSIS, by John Green. (Crash Course.) The author of "The Anthropocene Reviewed" chronicles the fight against the deadly infectious disease tuberculosis. <u>H B</u>
- 9. CLASS CLOWN, by Dave Barry. (Simon & Schuster.) The humorist and winner of a Pulitzer Prize for commentary recalls key moments and absurdities from his life.
- 10. THE FATE OF THE DAY, by Rick Atkinson. (Crown.) The author of "The British Are Coming" portrays the middle years of the American Revolution.
- 11. WHEN THE STONES SPEAK, by Doron Spielman. (Center Street.) An international spokesperson in the Israel Defense Forces Reserves gives a portrayal of the discovery of the City of David.
- 12. DIET, DRUGS, AND DOPAMINE, by David A. Kessler. (Flatiron.) The author of "The End of Overeating" examines ultraformulated foods and weight loss drugs.
